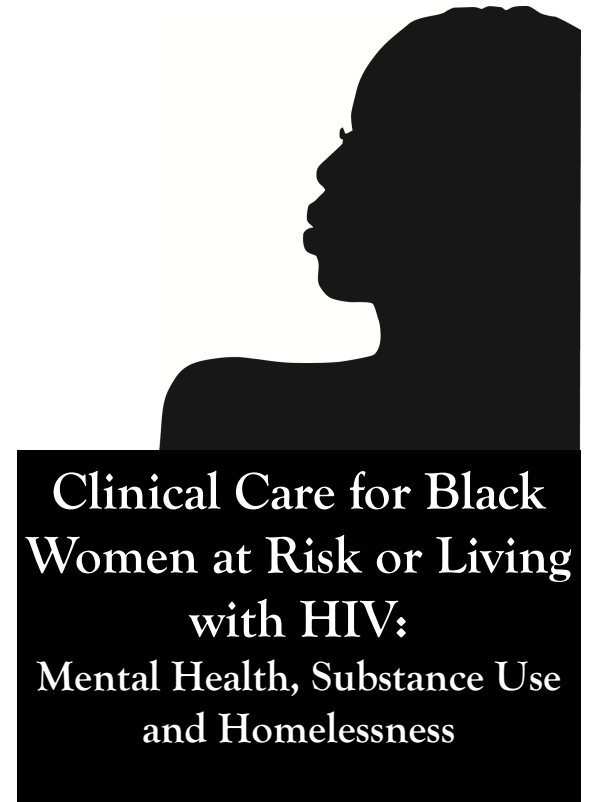
Continuing Education Units

Overview

Women are one of the fastest growing populations infected with HIV and the number of AIDS cases among women increase steadily each year. There are divergent reasons for this including racism, poverty, cultural differences, lack of knowledge of HIV testing, fear, and lack of trust in the medical system. We will particularly examine issues of co-occurring mental health disorders, substance use and/or homelessness. This training is aimed to increase your skills and knowledge in addressing cultural stereotypes and getting a better understanding of root causes that hinder access, engagement, and retention in care for Black women. We will also discuss best practices intended to improve clinical care.
